

We will encourage good communication within and outside the organisation, critical reflection and responsible innovation.

6 Governance and leadership


Under the leadership of our Board, we will ensure that Congress has exemplary governance and management policies and processes within an effective organisational structure.

A guide to working with Aboriginal Researchers in Central Australia

Rationale

This guide is intended to assist researchers and Research Institutes across Australia wishing to conduct research in Central Australia to engage Aboriginal Researchers to assist in facilitating research and data gathering.

Aboriginal Researchers can be defined by the trust they receive from the communities they work in. For an Aboriginal Researcher, trust and maintaining relationships are essential in order to effectively work with the community and stakeholders. The trust and maintaining relationships with the community helps research to obtain important insights from their communities.

Why?

For researchers and Research Institutes, the trust and maintaining relationships with the community and stakeholders is essential in order to effectively work with the community and stakeholders.

Who is this guide for?

If you are a researcher or a Research Institute interested in working with Aboriginal Researchers this guide will show you how to connect with researchers in a culturally appropriate and positive way, and get your head around important issues like Aboriginal protocols.

What is an Aboriginal Researcher?

Aboriginal Researchers are Aboriginal people who often live in and have relationships with their local communities and the relationships between Researchers and Research Institutes and the community. They are working to serve as a liaison/link/intermediary between Researchers and Research Institutes and the community because of their extensive knowledge and understanding of their relationships with the community.

Aboriginal Researchers contribute to research through their understanding and cultural competence of research. An Aboriginal Researcher contributes to research through different ways that includes but not limited to research p, facilitation and/or management, data collection, protocol and protocols advice, expertise, and insights.

Rationale

This guide is intended to assist Researchers and Research Institutes wishing to engage Aboriginal Peer Researchers in Central Australia to assist in facilitating research and data gathering.

The aim of this guide is to give people the confidence to truly engage and collaborate with Aboriginal communities and Aboriginal Peer researchers in Central Australia—to achieve research goals that benefit Aboriginal people and Research Institutes.

The Central Australian Aboriginal Congress (Congress) has utilised Aboriginal peer researchers in a number of studies, including More Options for STI Testing (MOST) in partnership with the Kirby Institute, UNSW and the Social Media & Tobacco Control in partnership with the Menzies School of Health Research. Through these studies Congress have acquired some lessons on not just best practice for engaging Peer Researchers but also the challenges and their celebrations.

Who is this guide for?

If you are a researcher or a Research Institute interested in working with Aboriginal Peer Researchers the guide will show you how to connect with peer researchers in a culturally appropriate and positive way, and help you get your head around important issues like protocols.

What is an Aboriginal Peer Researcher?

What is the difference between a Peer Researcher and a Researcher? Simply put the Peer Researcher belongs to the community or cohort being studied for a particular research project. Their expertise is sought because of their intimate

knowledge of their community or cohort and are willing to share these insights with Research Institutes.

Aboriginal Peer Research is a way of designing and delivering a research project with the Aboriginal people who are usually the subjects of research. It is an approach that has emerged from participatory and grass-roots research. Aboriginal Peer Researchers are Aboriginal people who live in, have relationships and a close understanding of the community the Research Study is taking place in. This trusting relationship enables them to serve as a liaison/link/intermediary between Researchers and Research Institutes and the community to improve the quality and cultural competence of research.

What are the benefits of involving Aboriginal Peer Researchers?

Engaging and investing in Aboriginal peer Researchers can provide rich access into people's lives and experiences. Their ways of understanding and knowing challenge professional researchers and help to ground all-too-often abstract expertise. Through peer research, you can open commissioning up to different ways of understanding people's experience, aspirations and challenges.

More and more ethics and funding bodies recommend the inclusion of Aboriginal Researchers be included in any research involving Aboriginal people and Aboriginal Communities. Engaging Aboriginal Peer Researchers will help build skills and professional development, and could lead to future study and employment.

Aboriginal communities and relationships can be incredibly complex collaborating with an Aboriginal Peer Researcher who can assist in navigating those complexities and save the study time, money and energy. In addition to this navigation, it is highly probable that data will be richer due to the Aboriginal Peer Researchers cultural proficiency.

While there are obvious benefits, there also can be significant challenges. During the MOST study, engaging Peer Researchers




Tips to working with language speakers

- Use simple language.
- No jargon or big words (Academic language).
- Use visual and animation to explain what you're saying and it makes people feel good.
- Languages are different in each community.
- To understand translation of language is not easy and everyone's method of translating is different.
- People who speak language don't necessarily speak from the community they are using their personal relationships, knowledge and skills.
- Aboriginal people have extensive ties and relationships with the community and when Aboriginal Researchers are working in the community, they are using their personal relationships, knowledge and skills.
- Be patient and open minded. Make sure you got enough time for community, research guidelines don't matter in the communities.
- Aboriginal researchers to decide what roles and responsibilities they can take on through the project as there may be cultural considerations you are not aware of that can impinge on them being able to carry out their roles safely.
- Be aware of the cultural sensitivities, considerations, protocols, without trying understand them and you need permission to quality of work.
- Get educated about the people you are trying to use for your study. Don't take away knowledge about the communities.
- Be willing and open to learn.
- Pay interpreters who are contractors pay them properly by the hour.
- For Aboriginal researchers, pay them accordingly to the ERA.


